


Fair Treatment









Frame by Values

 Use messaging that connects strongly to altruistic and open-minded values.






Values Circumplex












See-Saw Effect








Don't scare people

 Avoid messaging that activates fear and disgust or implies that all drug use is necessarily problematic.





Avoid law and order frame

 Avoid justifying drug policy reform or drug treatment services from the perspective of reducing crime or increasing community safety.

"Acting CEO of the prominent AOD organisation said a contested proposal to effectively decriminalise drug use - that's reportedly being considered by Cabinet - would help reduce crime and make NSW safer"



Don't myth-bust


 Stop reminding people of unhelpful ideas and tell your story instead.

Meth Myth 5: All Methamphetamine
Users Are Violent
Reality: Research shows that although
violent crime is observed among
methamphetamine users, these crime
rates are comparable to those seen in
groups that use other illicit drugs.



Abandon the War on Drugs

 Stop talking about the failed war on drugs. It traps us in an unhelpful frame and fails to move persuadable audiences





Put people who perpetuate stigma in the frame

• To shift the focus off people who use drugs, frame those who use perpetuate drug stigma as the problem.

"Shouldn't warnings, fines and referral to treatment be available for all people who use drugs, not just those who use the drugs society feels more comfortable about or those groups of people that society feel are more deserving of a second chance."



"Shouldn't warnings, fines and referral to treatment be available for all people who use drugs, not just those who use the drugs politicians feel more comfortable about or those groups of people that politicians feel are more deserving of a second chance."



Paint a new picture of people who use drugs

- Point to the diversity of people who use drugs in Australia to undermine simplistic stereotypes
- Bring alcohol into the frame.




Don't build empathy through enjoyment

 Framing drugs as enjoyable does not build empathy for people who use drugs





Frame dependance as a symptom



 Explain why substance dependence happens rather than imply it can happen to anyone

The Reframe Game

If you want to reduce drug use, you need to give people access to treatment and guide them in that direction instead of into the criminal justice system.
